3. Fundamentals

Focus on brilliance in the basics; this always leads to excellence
Make professional and personal goals; work hard to achieve them
Manage risk; deliberately plan for safe outcomes in everything you do
Strive to maintain the highest of standards; always give 100 percent effort
Do the right thing always; maintain your honesty, trustworthiness, and integrity
Have self and unit pride; know you are absolutely critical to the squadron's success
Know your job; continuously seek improvement of your technical and tactical proficiency
Hold others to standard; provide the leadership necessary to do so (regardless of your rank)
Use dedicated resources when in need; chaplain, medical, EPBHC, MFLC, UVA, SARC, OSCAR, etc.
Always demonstrate ethical behavior; adhere to our core values of honor, courage, and commitment
Communicate early and often; this facilitates proper planning and awareness throughout the squadron
