### Master Sergeant Jeremy T. Andres

Master Sergeant Jeremy T. Andres was born in Sacramento, California. He enlisted in the Marine Corps on 13 September 2004, and was assigned to Platoon 2025, Fox Company, 2nd Battalion, Marine Corps Recruit Depot San Diego, California. Upon graduation, he attended Marine Combat Training Battalion, School of Infantry West, Camp Pendleton, California. Upon completion, He attended and graduated from the Personnel Administration School, Camp Johnson, North Carolina; earning the military occupational specialty of 0151.



In March 2005, Private Andres received orders to 12th

Marine Regiment, Okinawa, Japan and served as an Administrative Clerk. In June 2005, he deployed to Zamboanga, Philippines as a Security Guard in support of the Joint Special Operations Task Force. In October 2005, he was promoted to the rank of Private First Class. In July 2006, he was promoted to the rank of Lance Corporal.

In March 2007, Lance Corporal Andres received orders to Student Personnel Administration Center, School of Infantry West, Camp Pendleton, California and served as an Infantry Training Battalion Orders Clerk. In October 2007, he was promoted to the rank of Corporal and assumed the billet of Section Chief. In October 2008, he was promoted to the rank of Sergeant and assumed duties as the Non-Commissioned Officer in Charge (NCOIC) of the Student Personnel Administration Center.

In August 2009, Sergeant Andres received orders to Marine Security Guard (MSG) School, Marine Corps Embassy Security Group, Quantico, Virginia. In October 2009, Sergeant Andres graduated and earned the title of MSG Watchstander. Upon graduation, he reported to U.S. Embassy Tashkent, Uzbekistan and assumed the collateral duties of Mess; Navy Motion Picture Services (NMPS), and Vehicle Non-Commissioned Officer (NCO).

In October 2010, Sergeant Andres received orders to U.S. Embassy Athens, Greece and assumed responsibilities as the Assistant Detachment Commander and collateral duties as the chemical, biological, radiological, and nuclear (CBRN) and Supply NCO. In October 2011, Sergeant Andres received orders to American Embassy Monrovia, Liberia where he assumed the duties as the Training, Mess, Vehicle, NMPS, Supply, and CBRN NCO.

In October 2012, Sergeant Andres reported to Consolidated Administration Center (CONAD), Headquarters and Service Battalion, Headquarters Marine Corps, Henderson Hall, Arlington, Virginia and served as the Inbound Section NCOIC. In January 2014, Sergeant Andres was promoted to the rank of Staff Sergeant and was assigned as the Staff Non-Commissioned Officer in Charge (SNCOIC) at the battalion's satellite office located in the Pentagon. In April 2015, Staff Sergeant Andres returned to Henderson Hall and served as the SNCOIC of the Outbound and Temporary Additional Duty Section.

In May 2016, Staff Sergeant Andres reported to Fleet Antiterrorism Security Team - Pacific, Yokosuka, Japan, and served as the Administrative Chief and additional duties as the Assistant Security Manager and Command Financial Specialist. In January 2017, Staff Sergeant Andres attended and graduated from the Advance Administrative Specialist Course, Camp Johnson, North Carolina. He was promoted to the rank of Gunnery Sergeant December 2017.

In December 2019, Gunnery Sergeant Andres graduated from MSG Training Center, Marine Corps Embassy Security Group, Quantico, Virginia. Upon graduation, he was assigned as the Detachment Commander of U.S. Embassy Luanda, Angola. In June 2021, Gunnery Sergeant Andres assumed the duties as the Academics Chief and Instructor Advisor at the MSG Training Center. He was promoted to the rank of Master Sergeant in August 2022.

In December 2022, Master Sergeant Andres reported to Marine Air Control Group 18, Okinawa, Japan and served as the Administrative Chief and additional duties as the Sponsorship Coordinator and Education Officer.

Master Sergeant Andres' personal awards include the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal (2 gold stars in lieu of third award) and the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal (3 gold stars in lieu of fourth award). Master Sergeant Andres is married to Anastasiya Ni and they have two sons; Christopher, 9-years old, and Benjamin, 2-years old.

But he still stood the watch.


He stood the watch so that our families, our fellow countrymen, and we could sleep soundly in safety each and every night, knowing that this Marine stood the watch.
